



Tamaan Osbourne-Roberts, MD, FAFP is the founder and principal of Daybreak Healthcare, an executive consulting firm specializing in physician leadership, health business quality initiatives, and medical media. He recently served as the Chief Medical Officer of Colorado's Health Care Policy and Financing department, the state agency overseeing Colorado's Medicaid program, and responsible for \$9.4 billion in expenditures (approximately 34% of the state's total budget), as well as Chief Medical Officer of the Center for Improving Value in Health Care (CIVHC), a rapidly growing 501(3)c organization dedicated to advancing the "Triple Aim" of lower cost, higher quality, and greater patient satisfaction through health care data and analytics (including administration of the Colorado All Payer Claims Database, the state's most comprehensive claims data set representing the majority of insured lives in Colorado and including all major commercial payers, Medicaid, and Medicare). He is also a consultant at the Center for Personalized Education for Physicians (CPEP), where he assists CPEP in monitoring and implementing physician evaluation, remediation, and practice re-entry programs.

In his clinical career, Dr. Osbourne-Roberts serves as a board-certified, practicing family physician at Iora Primary Care in Denver, Colorado, and maintains an academic appointment as an Assistant Clinical Professor of Family Medicine for the University of Colorado School of Medicine. He is a former member of the Colorado Health Service Corps, having spent the majority of his clinical career working as a primary care physician and critical access hospitalist for the underserved in multiple locations throughout rural and urban Colorado.

As a past-president of the Colorado Medical Society (at age 37, the youngest person, and first person of color, to serve as president in the organization's 143-year history), past-president and board chair of the Colorado Academy of Family Physicians (at the time, the youngest president and first African-American president in that organization's history), and past board of trustees member of the Colorado Hospital Association, Dr. Osbourne-Roberts has spent a substantial portion of his career advocating for sustainable and equitable healthcare policy in Colorado, and building coalitions between the multiple disparate parts of Colorado's healthcare ecosystem to facilitate healthcare reform. Through his work with the American Medical Association (AMA) and the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP), he has spent substantial time shaping national healthcare policy, including serving as a co-author of the policy that led the AMA to advocate for passage of the Affordable Care Act, currently serving on the AMA's Council on Science and Public Health and the AAFP's Commission on Quality and Practice, and previously serving on the AMA's External Advisory Committee on Value-Based Care.

An experienced speaker and media personality, Dr. Osbourne-Roberts has served as faculty for the Network for Regional Healthcare Improvement National Summit, the Congressional Black Caucus Spring Health Braintrust, The National Summit on Healthcare Price/Cost/Quality Transparency, and the AAFP National Conference of Constituency Leaders. He has been published in multiple local and national news outlets, has hosted or co-hosted several productions on cable television and online, and is a contributor to various blogs and other online forums.

A recipient of multiple honors and awards, he was named the 2019 Keynote Speaker for the University of Colorado School of Medicine Commencement Exercises, a 2016 Aspen Ideas Festival Spotlight Health Scholar, a 2015 Denver Business Journal '40 Under 40' recipient, and an American Medical Association Foundation Leadership Award recipient. His philanthropic work includes serving as a board member of the American Medical Association Foundation and Colorado Academy of Family Physicians Foundation, as well as serving as a charter board member of the Malawi Breastfeeding Initiative. He speaks four languages, two fluently.

Dr. Osbourne-Roberts completed his B.A. in English and biology at Williams College, where he was awarded the college's most prestigious scholarship, the Stephen H. Tyng Scholarship, at matriculation and its most prestigious prize, the William Bradford Turner Citizenship Prize, at commencement; he completed his M.D. at the University of Colorado School of Medicine, where he served as class commencement speaker, and where he also completed his family medicine residency training. He is currently a Pozen-Commonwealth Fellow in Health Equity Leadership at Yale University, where he is completing his MBA. A first-generation American of Trinidadian parentage, as well as an Air Force brat, he enjoys capoeira, freediving and scuba diving, angling and spearfishing, travel, cooking, and spending time with his wife, Camille, and children, Keston and Noelle.
